Emory Haynes Custer County VSO presented a Memorandum of Understanding Between the Nebraska Department of Veterans' Affairs & Custer/Blaine/Loup County for the term 1/2026 to 12/2028. Motion by Markham 2<sup>nd</sup> by Govier. Roll call vote. Ayes-All

Troy Walz-Extension Educator requested a reappointment for Bonnie Weinman (District III) to the Extension Board. Motion by Parliament 2<sup>nd</sup> by Markham to reappoint Bonnie Weinman. Roll call vote. Ayes-All

Motion by Govier 2<sup>nd</sup> by Kleeb to approve Deed of Reconveyance Lot 20 of Indian Hills First Addition to Broken Bow, Custer County Nebraska, CDBG loan. Roll call vote. Ayes-All

Dan Duren, Benefits Management provided an update on the County's new policy plans. The company reviewed Health Savings Account (HSA) plans of various local banks and recommended the County establish their HSA plans through Nebraska State Bank.

Motion by Markham 2<sup>nd</sup> Longmore to open an HSA account with NSB, \$15,500 to be deposited-decrease from the original \$28,000. Roll call vote. Ayes-All

Custer County through Benefits Management has already established an account with Point C. The amount carried in the account used to pay costs to medical providers was changed from \$75,000 to \$50,000. Motion by Blowers 2<sup>nd</sup> by Parliament to approve opening an HRA account at Nebraska State Bank Roll call vote. Ayes-All Nays-Gibbons

Recycling Center Manager Kelly Flynn began discussion on the Recycling Center. He has been collecting information regarding grant funding working with agencies such as Custer County Economic Development

Corporation, the Broken Bow Chamber of Commerce, and the Custer County Foundation. Had identified two primary grant sources for recycling – the Nebraska Recycling Council and the Nebraska State Department of Water, Energy, and Environment (DWEE). Recycling Center has received grants from both organizations in the past, primarily for the purchase or replacement of equipment used in the Center. New funding from either source would not be available until January 2027.

Supervisors asked numerous questions. District 1 Supervisor Anne Gibbons asked about out-of-county users bringing cardboard to the Recycling Center, Flynn stated that such customers are charged \$.02 per pound. The fee has been in place since 2018–Gibbons suggested this fee could be raised to help recover Center costs.

Govier asked Flynn whether bringing in materials from outside of the county was value-added or creating more work than could be supported by the Center's current funding. Flynn stated the larger volume of recyclables that could be received and processed by the center, the better. Govier then noted that revenue and volume has decreased over the last 10 years. Flynn responded that the elimination of glass recycling impacted on the overall volume, along with the decrease in the actual number and size of printed newspapers affecting the volume of paper recycled. Other business changes, such as the end of an agreement with BD for cardboard recycling have also impacted the flow of materials through the Center.

Gibbons suggested that commercial users with high volumes of cardboard recycling should foot the majority of the bill, asking “why should I pay for their recycling?” Flynn noted that with a 2025 population of 10,485 people in Custer County, the total bill for each person is \$16.69, per person, per year.

Gibbons later stated that she felt there were better uses for the money spent on the Recycling Center has lost over the last five years on something positive for the county.

Flynn disputed the notion that the funding was a loss, responding that in that time the Center had recycled over 3,000 tons of material that would have otherwise ended up in a landfill. The recycled materials saved funding on landfill fees and were re-used to create new products. “Recycling is designed to reduce solid waste – and its doing that,” said Flynn. “It’s been successful every year.”

Flynn pointed to the 10,000 lbs. of materials recycled by the Broken Bow Public Schools from packing materials for items brought in for new classrooms since August as another example of cardboard kept out of landfills. As the discussion turned to charging fees to different communities for use of the Custer County Recycling Center, it was noted that at least some had expressed a concern that the budget for their agency was set – adding new expenses was not going to be feasible at this point.

Markham suggested that it was going to be necessary to both have a plan for how much the county might charge outside users, and to know what communities would be willing to contribute.

Blowers noted that one prior suggestion had been to place the fate of the Recycling Center on a future ballot. Blowers and Custer County Attorney Steven Bowers reviewed the requirements to do so and determined this would not be feasible.

Govier reiterated that the county is still in a lease agreement with Myers Construction for use of the building housing the Recycling Center until February 2028 – another issue to consider regarding the fate of the program.

Motion by Gibbons 2<sup>nd</sup> by Longmore to notify Myers Construction that Custer County does not want to automatically renew the lease agreement. Roll call vote. Ayes-All

The supervisors discussed attempting to get support from cities and villages within Custer County and out of county locations currently using the Recycling Center.

Public comment was opened

Mark Cardoza noted though that this may not be a question of killing recycling as much as simply fiscal responsibility. The only way you're going to get more money in the future is to raise taxes

Donnis Hueftle-Bullock noted that recycling is not difficult, but that it is important as a duty to future generations to minimize what is being put into the land.

Joan Birnie stated everyone should commend Kelly for his work and time he has put in. He is an asset to the county. Government is a service, don't make money. Don't know why recycling has been singled out. We pay taxes for things we don't use.

Cliff Burnett don't understand why it keeps being brought up when it has been funded for the year. This is a public service, and it's not made to make money.

Denise Sughayar expresses support for the Custer County Recycling Center stating we're just beginning to scratch the surface as far as the impacts of microplastics on our environment and health, going to see that continue to increase as all these things we're putting into the landfill start to decompose.

Longmore stated he felt the towns need to step up.

Bobbi Kirkpatrick doesn't live in city, agreed with other comments.

Govier commented that the cost of the employees' wages and benefits wouldn't go away, be absorbed into another budget

Motion by Kleeb 2<sup>nd</sup> by Govier to continue the Recycling Center until the lease ends in February 2028, while looking for other funding. Roll call vote Ayes-Parliament, Govier, Kleeb Nayes-Markham, Longmore, Gibbons, Blowers, motion Failed

Motion by Blowers 2<sup>nd</sup> Longmore to continue funding the Recycling Center and table the discussion until June 2026, while gathering additional information about grants and support from area communities. Roll call vote. Ayes-All

Salary Committee presented recommendation on salaries for the next 4-year term of office. Motion by Longmore 2<sup>nd</sup> by Markham to pass Resolution #36-2025 setting Salaries for the 2027-2030 term. Starting salary for County Supervisors \$28,892.88; Assessor, Clerk, Clerk of District Court, Register of Deeds and Treasurer \$74,661.81; Sheriff \$92,717.97; Surveyor \$33,997.77; County Attorney \$110,018.48. this is a 4.5% increase in year one followed by a 3% increase each year until 2030. Roll call vote. Ayes-All

Motion by Markham 2<sup>nd</sup> Longmore to pass Resolution 37-2025 setting salaries for full-time deputies of elected officials. except the Sheriff's deputies, shall be figured at 65% to 75% at the discretion of the various county elected officials. The Sheriff's deputies shall be paid at the following rates, the Chief Deputy-85%, Sergeant-80%, and other deputies-75% of the Sheriff's salary. Roll call vote. Ayes-All

Meeting adjourned at 11:55 a.m.
